P-55 Crosses 101, 118 Freeways and Lives!

Finally some good news on the mountain lion front! P-55, who is collared and being tracked by the National Park Service (NPS), was recently documented as crossing the 101 and 118 freeways. As reported in the Daily News "The uncowardly lion had a busy weekend in late July, first being caught on camera in a backyard in Newbury Park, then cutting across the 101 Freeway in the early hours on July 30."

According to Seth Riley, a wildlife ecologist with Santa Monica Mountains Natural Recreation Area, "The overwhelming pattern we've observed through GPS tracking is lions coming up to the edge of a freeway and turning around."

NPS/SMMNRA Partner with AFC

The National Park Service has one of the largest urban national park units right here in Southern California. How familiar are you with the Santa Monica Mountains National Recreation Area?

SMMNRA was designated in 1978 and is operated through partnerships between the NPS, the Santa Monica Mountains Conservancy, California State Parks and other agencies. It comprises approximately 153,000 acres, 23,000 of which are owned and managed by the National Park Service. Congressman Adam Schiff has been working for years to augment the SMMNRA with a ring of land around the L.A. valleys, that includes the Arroyo Seco, called the Rim of the Valley Corridor.

When SMMNRA's Superintendent David Szymanski learned that our Hahamongna to Tujunga Wildlife Corridor overlays a sizable portion of the Rim of the Valley Corridor, he suggested our two staffs meet. On a hot afternoon in September, we met with David and NPS staffers responsible for science, land management (including wildlife corridors), programs and outreach, in the cool of Cottonwood Canyon under its canopy of native trees. We each shared that our most consequential challenge is the same - to enhance healthy biodiversity by connecting our urban islands of natural habitat. As climate changes, more wildlife will need to move to new foraging, breeding and sheltering locations. If the Rim of the Valley Corridor is adopted, NPS will be able to work directly with us in our region.

By sharing our programs and goals, we each learned how we can begin to help each other. One example is our program to set up cameras throughout the Hahamongna to Tujunga Wildlife Corridor to better understand the needs of wildlife and humans. The NPS is also setting up a camera transect but in a different region of Los Angeles which will give us a stronger foundation on which to build a new and important partnership. In fact, as part of our partnership with the NPS, AFC received a technical assistance grant to help us with the Hahamongna to Tujunga Wildlife Corridor for 2 years through their Rivers, Trails, and Conservation Assistance Program.

And oh, by the way, they loved Cottonwood Canyon!

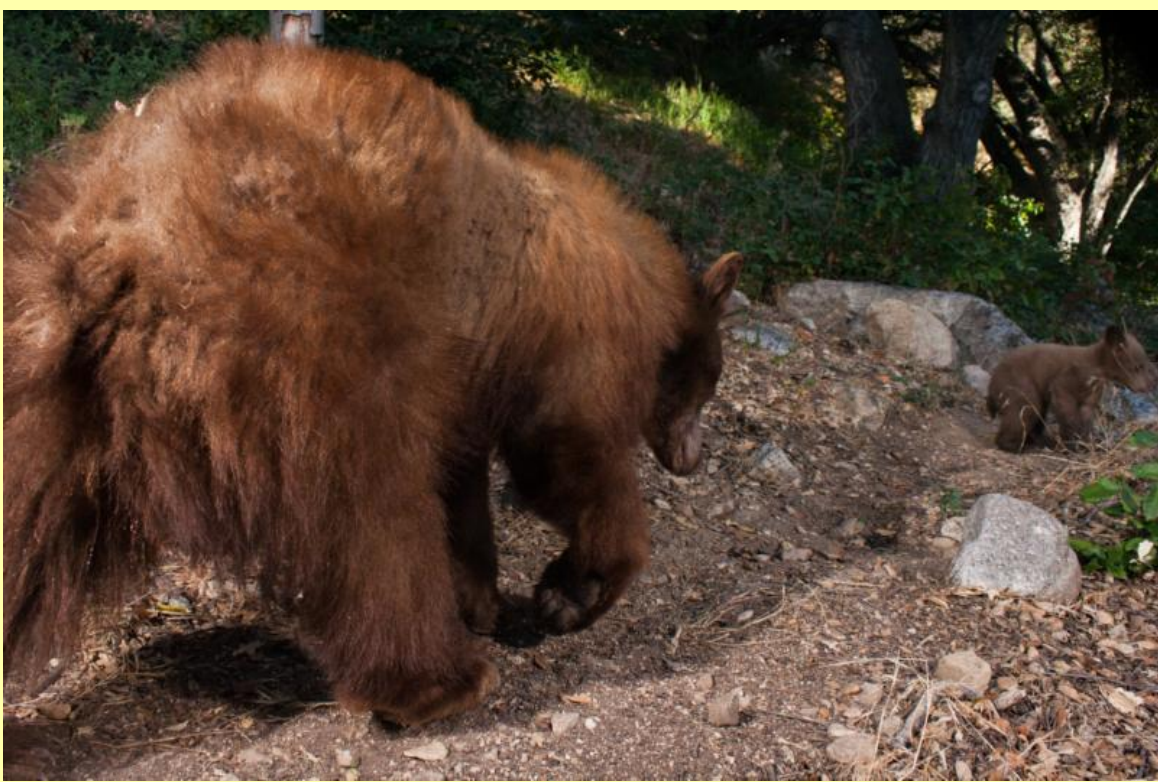
Special AFC thanks to Rachel-Ann Arias and Annika Near-Ansari. Both from Girl Scout troop 1711, the two girls created invasive plant and wildlife guides for the Rosemont Preserve as their Girl Scout silver award project and are eager to share them with you!

The girls will debut their new wildlife guides on **October 28th, 9:00am at the Rosemont Preserve**. They will lead a hike through the preserve and demonstrate how to use their guides to learn about invasive plants and the types that live in the area, as well as how to identify signs of local wildlife that comes through the preserve by looking at scat and tracks.

Rachel-Ann enjoys studying wildlife and used her camera trap (motion activated camera) to capture wildlife in the preserve. She has participated in several nature tracking / citizen science projects through the Los Angeles Natural History Museum, served as a Citizen Science Ambassador through Cornell University and volunteers in the zoology and marine biology laboratory at Occidental College. Both girls are in 8th grade, Rachel-Ann at Rosemont Middle School, and Annika at California School of the Arts in the Musical Theater conservatory. Annika first became interested in learning about invasive plant species as a young child while starting a non-invasive garden with her grandparents. She has helped select new plants every year since.
